Looking Ahead to a Busy Construction Season



This spring and summer will be a busy construction season for Roeland Park as we work to make several road, sidewalk and building improvements throughout the city. In the coming months, you will see the following areas undergoing improvements.



Bike lanes planned for Mission Road in 2025.

Mission Road from 47th to 53rd Street - In partnership with the cities of Westwood and Fairway, Roeland Park will resurface Mission Road, make streetlighting improvements, repair sidewalks, and curbs, and mark bike lanes. This project will be funded in part by a CARS grant through Johnson County.

Nall Avenue from 51st to 58th Street - Nall Avenue will be resurfaced for the entire project area. Other improvements will include full depth pavement repairs, curb repairs, and sidewalk replacements. Of the roughly \$1 million budget for this work, the City will contribute around \$300,000 with the rest being funded through a Johnson County Stormwater grant & a Federal Transportation grant.

El Monte to Delmar Sidewalk - A sidewalk will be constructed between the end of the cul-de-sac on El Monte Street and Delmar Street to provide a direct route for Roseland Elementary students that live on El Monte Street, creating a safer route for kids.

Community Center Phase 2 Renovations - Improvements to lighting, ceilings, flooring, and wall coverings are being made throughout the building. The fitness area is undergoing renovation as well and will be more open with higher ceilings. The building grounds will also see some sprucing with new irrigation system and tuckpointing of the planters.

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MIGHTY BIKE

The newest feature at R Park, the "Mighty Bike" is almost here! The interactive sculpture is being fabricated and its installation will be coming soon. "Mighty Bike", pictured in the rendering below will be a large bicycle that is also a play structure. This interactive sculpture will compliment the bike tracks already in place at the park. Keep your eyes on the southeast corner of R Park, for this new sculpture and play structure. The concrete pad has already been poured and "Mighty Bike" will soon be ready to ride!

Now through May 3rd, the art gallery at City Hall is happy to feature artist Laura White. White is a Mission-based blind-deaf artist who creates intricate beaded quilts, that she describes as therapeutic and a means of storytelling. She utilizes her background as a graphic designer and is inspired by patterns from her memory of the time before she lost her eyesight. Due to her limited eyesight, she will work with friends and family to select colors for her pieces, which she feels adds a communal aspect to her work. Her works have been featured at the Nelson-Atkins, Johnson County Arts and Heritage Center, and the Englewood Art Center.

A LETTER FROM THE MAYOR

Hey RP,

I have some big news for you. Following the City Council meeting on March 3, I signed into effect a newly amended development agreement with TMM Roeland Park Centers, LLC – owner of the Walmart-anchored shopping center in the heart of our city. The amended agreement outlines a revised scope and timeline for TMM to make necessary and long-overdue improvements to the site. These changes were intentionally drafted by the governing body to address community concerns about site utilization, internal traffic flow and overall aesthetics.

As part of the amended agreement, \$2 million of the existing CID funds will be available to the owner to assist with approved site improvements at the original \$1 reimbursement for every \$2 of private investment. The \$1.3 million CID funds will be transferred to the city's newly created economic development fund, intended to promote diversified redevelopment throughout the city. Additionally, the property owner has agreed to provide scheduled progress reports, to contribute to the city's 1% for Art program, and to keep community members informed with signage on the property that includes project details and timelines.

As early as this summer, and over the next few years, we will see noticeable improvements to the shopping center which include building and parking lot upgrades, and re-tenanting of the vacant storefronts. These improvements reflect a renewed commitment by the property owner to invest in the future of our community, and strengthen the city's promise to continue building a vibrant community for you and future Roeland Parkers.



THERE'S A BETTER WAY THAN MOSQUITO SPRAY!

Are you ready for summer, but dreading pesky mosquitos?


According to the K-State Extension office, "the most effective method of controlling mosquito populations is targeting the larval stage and the sites where they develop. Once mosquitoes become flying adults, control is more difficult and expensive." Dunk buckets are an effective way to control mosquitoes by targeting the larvae.

Dunks in combination with removing standing water can provide effective mosquito relief without spraying your yard, leaving extra money in your pocket for summer fun!



What are dunk buckets?

Dunk buckets are a simple DIY way to kill mosquito larvae using BTI, a type of bacteria that kills mosquito larvae but is harmless to humans, animals, birds, fish, pollinators and the soil. When female mosquitos lay their eggs in buckets of water treated with BTI dunks, 100% of the larvae that develop will be killed, stopping the life cycle.

Benefits of dunk buckets:



- Non-toxic to pollinators
- Low maintenance
- Long-lasting
- Budget-friendly
- Pet and family friendly
- More effective than killing adult mosquitos

Negatives of mosquito sprays:



- Sprays don't discriminate, natural and organic sprays kill both pollinators and pests
- Expensive
- Kills only a fraction of adult mosquitos, requiring repeated applications

Additional Control Measures:

- Empty standing water from buckets, old tires, wheelbarrows, tarps, etc.
- Change water in bird baths weekly
- Aerate ponds and pools
- Ensure gutters don't hold water, remove accordion downspouts
- Use fans to disrupt flight
- Install bat houses

Get a Free Supply of Dunk Buckets!

Sign-up using the QR code to participate and receive a free 4-month supply of mosquito dunks (while supplies last). Dunks can be picked up at City Hall. All we ask is that you tell your neighbors and give us feedback at the end of the season. The more neighbors that participate, the better the control! Ripple Glass Year in Review


2024 marked the second year of curbside glass recycling service using Ripple Glass. 72 tons of glass were recycled through curbside pick-up, with another 122 tons recycled at the purple bin at Aldi, for a total of 194 tons, way to go! Over the course of the year, Roeland Park reduced 10 tons of carbon emissions. That's the equivalent of eliminating 2 cars from our roads or planting 397 trees! Last year was a great year for glass recycling in Roeland Park, let's make 2025 even better!
